# Declaration WORKING TOGETHER

We, the representatives of governments of the Yukon, hereby affirm our commitment to work together in the spirit of reconciliation and collaboration. We remain committed to a constructive relationship that contributes to and promotes good governance for all Yukoners.

In particular, we commit to the following.

- 1. Participate in up to four meetings of the Yukon Forum per year as agreed to and schedule the dates of the meetings in advance, unless otherwise agreed.
- Conduct the meetings in order to facilitate frank discussions, debate issues and learn about the positions and interests of others and have substantive outcomes. We recognize that these discussions may be contentious at times, but they will be respectful.
- 3. Treat the discussions that take place at the Yukon Forum and related working groups as confidential unless otherwise agreed.
- 4. Ensure the Yukon Forum is solutions-focused at a political level and does not limit the options available in any negotiation process.
- 5. By the next Yukon Forum, create a joint five-year action plan that identifies common priorities and ensures a clear plan for implementation options that are collaborative and transparent. The plan may be refined or updated as needed.
- 6. Provide directions to officials to carry out specific duties and activities as agreed.

### Yukon Forum Action Plan

This Action Plan is the result of the collaborative work being done at the Yukon Forum and direction from Yukon First Nation and Government of Yukon leaders as committed to in the Working Together Declaration.

The goal of the Yukon Forum is to foster reconciliation, develop strong government-to-government relations and collaborate on priorities shared by the Government of Yukon and Yukon First Nations.

This document lays out the next steps that will be undertaken by a number of joint working groups under the following priority areas: Fiscal Relations, Land Claims and Self-Government Agreement Implementation and Bi-lateral/Tri-lateral Processes for Engagement.

Intergovernmental collaboration on this scale has not been done before. Establishing effective processes takes time, careful consideration and flexibility in order to be successful.

The joint priorities identified by our governments address long standing and complex issues. In many cases we are not starting from scratch – past reviews have been completed and existing processes are in place. Many of these priorities also require engagement and participation from the Government of Canada.

As stated in the Working Together Declaration, our governments are committed to working together in the spirit of reconciliation and collaboration.

This updated Action Plan recognizes the work we've accomplished to date and outlines the next steps to advance our shared priorities.

# Fiscal Relations

	Self-governing Yukon First Nations and Government of Yukon to establish a suitable funding mechanism with Canada that provides sustainable, sufficient and consistent funding in support of meeting their current and future housing needs. This funding mechanism must address both 'catch up' and 'keep up' elements.
3. Trilateral Fiscal Matters	Self-Governing Yukon First Nations and Government of Yukon continue to work together and with Canada towards addressing fiscal matters which affect bilateral and trilateral fiscal relations.
	Bilaterally, the Government of Yukon and Self-governing First Nations have identified the scope of interests for discussion, and have prioritized agreements on Carbon Rebate Sharing and renewing Personal Income Tax Sharing Agreements.
	The parties continue exploratory discussions on the other fiscal matters.
